Philanthropy VP

1. Guest Speaker – Andrew Nishimoto Family Promise

Catarina Jang introduced Andrew Nishimoto, Executive Director at Family Promise. Family Promise provides short term shelter to families experiencing homeless in the South Bay. They believe no child should have to sleep in a car, park, or under a bridge. Every family should be whole and have a roof over their head. Family Promise provides short term shelter, meals, case management and hospitality. They work with 29 congregations that help them with gifts cards for gas and food. Their services have been expanding. In 2017 they helped four families, 2018 six families, 2019 sixteen families, and 2020 twenty families. They have expanded their programs to service children that really needed support. They added an early intervention and stabilization program so they were able to help over 100 kids in the South Bay that were living in the housing and security. They also hired a Children's Coordinator in February 2020 specifically to help develop programs for the kids. The timing was perfect since the pandemic hit the Coordinator was able to help the kids transition to online learning and implemented the Distance Learning Program. They provided school supplies, internet, computers, tutors, and technical & academic support to help them with their learning. No one missed a day of school. During the summer staff was able to so virtual classes, art, cooking, sports. In the Fall the kids were ahead of the where they were because they were already set up for distance learning and there were no technical glitches. Andrew gave a huge thank you to Vistas for the support they receive. Vistas support allowed them to hire Children's Coordinator and offer all the programs to help the kids with the distance learning.

Question asked if the same facilities are used all the time: Pre-pandemic the overnight shelter was rotated but the day center was always in the same spot. With the pandemic families are staying at the day centers all the time. Normally the congregations set up the spots on a weekly basis.

Question asked on how long do they help a family: they try to keep it under 90 days but there is no limitation. In 2019 the average time spent was 85 days, in 2020 it was 120 days but they try to keep it under 90 days. It's a crisis center and they want to move families into permanent shelter. The kids can continue with the distance learning once they leave.

Video – Brenda Chandler speaks about her success story. Brenda and her daughter went to Family Promise 3 years ago seeking shelter. After several months of counseling, budgeting, and encouragement from the

staff/volunteers they were able to get into a place of their own. Since Family Promise gave them so much to her, Brenda joined the Board of Directors.

Question asked on how many applicants do they get: They are a part of LA Country Homeless Service Provider. They can be reached by calling 211 or go to 211.com online. Families that are being evicted or losing their home are referred to Family Promise. They also partner with cities in the area. Last year there were about 335 people that called in, this year there were close to 400. They can't help everyone so aside from offering shelter they offer Diversion & Prevention Services. For those that are close to eviction they have funding, counseling services, and mediation to help keep them in their house. For those that have been evicted they can get them connected to family members or find them a temporary space until they can get them permanent housing.

Question asked about resource for the families they cannot help: They have other partnerships including Harbor Interfaith. They cross refer to each other. Family Promises focuses on families close to sustainability while Harbor Interfaith focuses on those that needing ongoing government assistance. They also partner with Communities Child that service mothers with young children, newborns, and infants. The Salvation Army that helps with food. There are times where they do not have the funding to help families.

Question asked on education provided: 3 main focus outside of providing shelter are

Employment – resume writing to help them get employed or advancing their employment by going back to school and getting certified.

Relationships – helping them build their support system with family and friends

Budgeting and Finance – teaching them to have a plan in prioritizing their finances and offering them credit repair classes so they can be successful once they leave the program.

Question asked on what measure were taken during Covid: They eliminated volunteer interaction between families which is a huge part of their program. Families at rotational shelter in Torrance of families at the transitional shelters in San Pedro Wilmington, and Long Beach stay at those shelters and exist as one household. Outsiders must wear masks, shields and social distance.
